5- The Ministry of Foreign Affairs urges Egyptian citizens abroad to apply for new electronic passports:

Upon the instruction of the International Civil Aviation Organization regarding the expiration of manually issued passports in all international airports on 24 November 2015, the Egyptian Ministry of Foreign Affairs urges all Egyptian citizens abroad who do not have electronic passports to apply for them before this date. This will help citizens avoid any obstacles in traveling abroad or returning to Egypt.

6- International "Culture Under Threat" conference presents declaration to protect antiquities:

Egypt hosted the "Culture Under Threat" Conference in Cairo, bringing together UNESCO and ten nations from the MENA region to address the growing destruction, looting and trafficking of antiquities across the Middle East. These antiquities also finance terrorist groups such as ISIL. The conference resulted in several recommendations under the auspices of a new "Cairo Declaration" including:

- A working group formed from the ten participating Arab countries to combat looting and smuggling
- The establishment of an international advisory committee, chaired by Egypt, to support the working group and study means to combat antiquities looting.
- An exploration of additional regional and global efforts to fight against illicit looting and trading of stolen antiquities <u>read more...</u>

On 27 April, General Motors (GM) hosted a dinner in honor of Egypt and our long-standing partnership. GM maintains a strong presence in Egypt, directly employing more than 1,900 people, and indirectly employing over 25,000 people in dealerships and supporting industries. Over the past seven years, GM has invested more than \$78 million in its Egyptian operations. At March's Egyptian Economic Development Conference (EEDC) in Sharm El Sheikh, GM also announced plans to invest an additional \$46 million, reaffirming its commitment to Egypt. <u>read more...</u>
